Our Vision

We envision a community where our homes, neighborhoods, and business districts are safe places to live and work. Our community supports its residents by providing adequate law enforcement and affordable housing options.



How Are We Doing?

According to survey responses, approximately 98 percent of our residents feel safe in their neighborhoods and approximately 95 percent trust our law enforcement personnel. Crimes related to assault, burglary, and property damage declined by approximately 17 percent over the past five years, but drug and narcotic offenses increased by approximately 21 percent. Despite a decline in housing values, a need remains for affordable work-force housing, and an increasing number of persons are at risk for chronic homelessness, indicating a need for transitional and permanent supportive housing.

Community Safety

Community safety refers to how residents feel about their personal security. Residents should feel comfortable and safe in their homes, in their neighborhoods, and while traveling around the community. Equally important is the perception of how law enforcement personnel are involved in preventing and resolving crime.

What does this measure?

Respondents reported their perception of safety within Harrisonburg and Rockingham County neighborhoods. They also indicated their trust of law enforcement personnel.

How are we doing?

Respondents indicated strongly that they feel safe in their neighborhoods and trust law enforcement personnel. In comparison to the 2006 survey, there is considerable increase in the percentage of persons who perceive that Harrisonburg and Rockingham County are safe places to live and raise a family and that our law enforcement can be trusted to provide the safe environment that is necessary for a thriving community.

Domestic Violence

According to the *2010 Virginia Attorney General Domestic Violence Report*, there were more than 63,000 calls to domestic and sexual violence hotlines across the State in 2009, representing an 8 percent increase in calls from the year before. At least 124 men, women, and children lost their lives to domestic violence. A total of 12,823 persons in Virginia received domestic violence assistance and 5,714 adults and children received 214,427 nights of emergency or temporary shelter due to domestic violence; however, 2,227 families requesting shelter services were turned away due to lack of shelter space. A total of 36,922 emergency protective orders were issued by magistrates and judges across the Commonwealth to protect the immediate health and safety of victims and their family members.

What does this measure?

Respondents reported their experiences with each of the seven domestic violence behaviors listed in the tables below and on the following page.

How are we doing?

According to *CrimeReports.com*, the City of Harrisonburg Police Department received 243 domestic and family offense calls from October 12, 2010 to April 08, 2011. On average this is more than one call per day in the City of Harrisonburg alone. First Step provides services to survivors of domestic violence from the City of Harrisonburg and Rockingham County. From July 1, 2010 to March 31, 2011, First Step received 277 crisis calls, provided shelter to 78 adults and 45 children, and provided supportive services to 179 individuals.

Crime Incidents

According to the *Preliminary 2010 Uniform Crime Report*, reported crimes across the nation have declined by 6.2 percent. In Virginia, according to the *2009 Virginia State Police Report*, 300,119 incidents of violent, property, or drug-based crimes were reported. Healthy communities regard crime as an issue pertinent to the well-being of its residents.

What does this measure?

Secondary data indicates the number of reported incidents of violent, property, and drug-based crimes in Harrisonburg City, Rockingham County, and the State of Virginia.

How are we doing?

Overall, crimes related to assault, burglary, and property damage declined in Harrisonburg and Rockingham County by 17 percent from 2006 to 2010. Reports of sexual violence did not significantly change despite efforts to make sexual assault prevention a priority in the 2006 Virginia Assembly. Drug and narcotic offenses increased approximately 21 percent during this time period.

Homelessness

Low wages, a lack of available, affordable housing, and unemployment can force people out of their homes. At times, a lack of ongoing health care for physical illnesses, disabilities, or emotional and relational reasons make it difficult for persons to meet their basic needs. Safe housing for chronically homeless individuals and families facing hardship is a growing challenge for our community.

What does this measure?

The annual *Homeless Point-in-Time Survey* counts the number of persons who are homeless on a given day each year in Harrisonburg and Rockingham County. At the time these persons were surveyed, they were found in emergency shelters, transitional housing programs, temporary housing in motels, outdoors without shelter, or temporarily in the homes of friends or family members. This information gives us a snapshot of who is unable to obtain and maintain permanent housing in our community.

How are we doing?

According to the *Homeless Point-in-Time Survey*, the number of homeless adults in Harrisonburg and Rockingham County has generally increased since 2007. The number of homeless is trending upward, with the exception of 2011, even as the cost of rentals and home ownership has been moderated due to the downturn in the economy since 2008.

The Harrisonburg and Rockingham County Continuum of Care agencies are responding to the needs of our most vulnerable citizens by working to create additional shelter beds and transitional housing options that will help individuals and families move from homelessness to stable and permanent housing. Since 2006 the City of Harrisonburg has added emergency housing capacity during the winter months.

**Early in 2011, Harrisonburg and Rockingham Housing Authority completed its rehab of housing units and they became available for occupancy. The number of units increased from 50 to 60 units.

Work Force Housing

Affordable housing is essential to recruit and retain a strong work force for our community, and yet it is a growing challenge. The Harrisonburg Redevelopment and Housing Authority, Chamber of Commerce, and Shenandoah Valley Partnership are working together to develop strategies for more affordable housing options.

What does this measure?

This information indicates the median annual household income necessary to afford a home of median price in the Harrisonburg and Rockingham County areas.

How are we doing?

Due to the downturn in the economy since 2008, the average price of a home in Harrisonburg and Rockingham County has decreased by approximately 14 percent since 2005. The average salary has increased approximately 2 percent since 2005. Despite the decrease in housing values, the data still indicates a gap between the actual median household income earned in our area compared to the income necessary to afford a home of median price.
